PIONEER SETTLER

JOHANN EBERHARD REAM, BORN IN LEIMEN, GERMANY ON OCTOBER 6, 1607 GAME TO AMERICA WITH HIS FAMILY IN 1717. THEY WERE THE FIRST WHITE PEOPLE IN THIS AREA. HAVING ARRIVED HERE IN 1723 OR 4. HE RECEIVED TWO CRANTE OF LAND, 360 ACRES AND 113 ACRES, FROM THE SONS OF WILLIAM PENN. HIS ELEVEN CHILDREN WERE, JACOB 1713, AND MELL AND ADM. WHOSE DIRTH DATES ARE UNKNOWN. ON FEBRUARY 15, 1750, EBERHARD AND HIS WIFF DIVIDED MOST OF THEIR LAND AMOND THEIR GEVEN LIVING SONS WORDING EACH SECO. TOR THE NATURAL LOVE AND AFFECTION WHICH THEY BEAR TO THEIR SON. THEY ARE SURIED IN REAM'S CEMETERY, 1/2 MILE TO THE SOUTHWEST.

FOUNDER OF REAMSTOWN

IN 1760 TOBIAS REAM DIVIDED THE 54 ACRES HE RECEIVED FROM HIS PARENTS IN 1750 INTO BUILDING LOTS AND FOUNDED THIS TOWN WHICH HE WAMED ZONAR. THE LOTS WERE 86 FEET WIDE AND 207 FEET DEEP AND WERE SOLD ON THE GROUND REST PLAN. THE FIRST DEEDS WERE DELIVERED ON SEPTEMBER 24, 1751. ON JURE 8, 1772 TOBIAS (17523—1007) AND JULIANA (1702—1564) IN WHITE HELD THE WERE THAN THE FIRST DEEDS WERE DELIVERED ON SEPTEMBER 24, 1751. ON JURE 8, 1754 TO ANDREW REAM AND JACOS RUPP. TRUSTECS, FOR A PREC SCHOOLHOUSE, CHURCH, AND BURYING SROUND. THIS IS WHERE THE LUTHERNA HAD REPOWED CHURCH MOR STAND. THEY WERE THE PARENTS OF TEN CHILDREN AND RET BUSIED IN REAM'S CEMETERY, 1/2 MILE TO THE SOUTHWEST.


### **Pioneer Settler**

Johann Eberhard Ream, born in Leimen, Germany on October 6, 1687 came to America with his family in 1717. They were the first white people in this area, having arrived here in 1723 or 4. He received two grants of land, 389 acres and 113 acres, from the sons of William Penn. His eleven children were, Jacob 1713, Anna 1716, Abraham 1718, Nicholas 1721, John 1723, Mathias 1726, Tobias 1733, Andrew 1737, and Susanna, Samuel, and Adam, whose birth dates are unknown. On February 15, 1759, Eberhard and his wife divided most of their land among their seven living sons wording each deed "for the natural love and affection which they bear to their son." They are buried in Ream's Cemetery 1/2 mile to the southwest.

"The citizens of the Reamstown community and the members of the Ream family throughout the U.S.A. deeply appreciate the gift of Mrs. Irene R. Weidman, Ephrata Pa., to the Memorial Park Association. Her gift made possible the erection of this Ream Memorial. 

- "The following parties have been proclaimed three times, and have been married afterwards on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of April 1712.
- "Johann Eberhard Riehm, baker and citizen, single and a legitimate son of Hans Andreas Riehm, a citizen of the place, and Miss Anna Elisabetha, single, legitimate daughter of Jost Schwab, citizen and baker of this place.

• While this record shows a date of birth in June 1712, it is more likely it was 1713 given that his sister Anna Catharina was baptized within three days of her birth and that Johann Eberhard Ream only married Jacob's mother in April 1712. Unable to confirm either way without a birth record from Germany.

# Summer/Fall 1717 – Johann Eberhard and Elisabeth arrive in the Colonies.

- "...in 1717, ...the local baker, Johann Eberhardt Riehm, set out for the New World. He went with William Penn to Philadelphia, and thence to the wilds of Lancaster County. there he took up the difficult task of clearing the land and tilling the soil, making friends with the Indians." Source: letter from Ream descendant "Dave" Sep 1960 following a trip to Leimen, Germany
- Eberhardt, Elizabeth, and their first two children Jacob and Katharina, left Leimen in the fall of 1717 for the trip down the Rhine to Rotterdam, and thence across the Atlantic to Philadelphia. Within two or three years, they were joined in Philadelphia by Elizabeth's parents, Jost and Anna Katharina Schwab; Jost had also been a baker in Leimen, perhaps his son-in-law's boss. written by David Ream and found on Ancestry It is not known just what Eb and his family did in their first couple of years in America. Certainly they were in Philadelphia for a awhile... But by 1720 they, along with the Schwabs, had moved west into the wilds of Leacock Township in Lancaster County; Katharina Schwab died in Leacock in 1720, and Nicholas Riehm was born in Leacock in 1721. In 1724, Eb bought land (from John Penn, son of William) a few miles north in Cocalico Township and settled down to establish his farm in what is now Reamstown. written by David Ream and found on Ancestry

Capt. Richmond, Capt. Towor, & Capt. Eyers, waited upon the Board with the List of the Palatines they had Imported here from London; By which List it appeared that Capt. Richmond had Imported One hundred & sixty-four, Capt. Towor Ninety-one, and Capt. Eyers One-hundred & Eight.

The above document, from the Pennsylvania archives, Colonial Records, Vol. 2 is quoted by Ream descendent Forest Ream who notes: "In the lists referenced above we find a record of the arrival of our Rim (Ream) and Schwab families that later were found in the vicinity of Leacock and Reamstown, PA, which at that early date was properly designated as Conestogo Twp., Chester Co., PA. I have yet to find the actual lists or manifests. Need to continue searching. Sources:

1 Mar 1719 – Warrant to Eberhard for 200 acres near New Strasburg, Chester County, PA. "By the Commissioners of Property. At the Request of Everard Ream now of New Strasburg that we would grant him to take up in or near that Township the quantity of two hundred acres of land for which he agrees to pay to the use of the Trustees of the Province within three months after the date hereof Twenty pounds mony of Pennsilvania for the whole & the yearly quitrent of one Shilling Sterling for each hundred acres. These are to authorize and Require thee to Survey or cause to be :Survey'd unto the Said Edward (Everard) Ream at the place aforesaid according to the Method of Townships appointed the said quantity of two hundred acres of Land that has not been already Survey'd nor appropriated nor is seated by the Indians and make Returns thereof into the Secretarys office which survey in case ye said Edward fulfill the above agreement shall be valid otherwise the same shall be void as if it had never been made nor this warrant ever granted. Given under our hands and ye Seal of the Province of Philadelphia the 1st day of the 3rd mo. A.D. 1719. Signed Richd Hill, Isaac Norris, James Logan. To Jacob Taylor Survr Genrl. ### 1723/1724 – Eberhard and Elisabeth settle in Lancaster Co, PA.

• Eberhard and Anna Elisabetha Riehm settled their family on the banks of the Cocalico Creek. Their nearest neighbors were the Delaware Indians who lived in a village across the creek from the Riehms. The Riehm boys grew up with these peaceful Indians and hunted and fished with them. Johann Eberhardt Riehm and his family were members of the Muddy Creek Reformed Church. Tobias Ream, a son of Eberhard, laid out a plan for a town to be called Zoar, located on land deeded to him by his father. This town was commonly called Reamstown even in the early days of the town's history when it was officially called Zoar. In 1803 the name was of icially changed to Reamstown when the post of ice was established there. The town celebrated its bicentennial in 1960. - "In the north-eastern part of the country, a settlement was commenced about the year 1723 or 4 by Everhard Ream, whose descendants still reside in the village called after the first settler and proprietor. This place, like many others, was occupied solely by the Indians, at the time Mr. Ream located here. He ventured with his wagon and horse into the woods, where he unloaded his "fixtures and furniture" under a large oak tree that spread its extended boughs over him and his small family till he had put up a rude hut of logs, which is built upon what is now Lesher's farm. His nearest mill was on the Brandywine, and his nearest neighbors, the Mullbachers, then living on Mill creek. Isaac Taylor requests in behalf of Rob't Green the Grant of about 50 acres of Land adjoyning on his Plantation on the Edge of Rockland Mannor, in Bromingham, it being a Parcell left when the Lands thereabout were granted to other Persons.

Eberherd Ream, of Conestogo, requests the Grant of about 200 acres of Land on a branch of that Creek, including a small Indian Settlem't, called Cocallico. He has the Indians' consent to settle and can pay the purchase Money down.

# 1724 – Settling in

"In the summer of 1724, Eberhard moved his family which later grew to include 11 children, into
this new country, inhabited only by a colony of Indians living along Cocalico Creek. Ream's
wagon load of furniture and household goods was halted under a large oak tree and under the
spreading branches he pitched his tent. He lived there with his family until he cut trees and built

- a log cabin. Conjecture is that Eberhard chose this location because it was close to a good spring of water.
- For the first few years, the Ream family lived by themselves with their nearest neighbors residing 12 miles to the north along Mill Creek which is the present site of Newmanstown. The Indians along the Cocalico Creek were friendly and the Ream children grew up playing, hunting, and fishing with the Indian children.
- The Reams were not a poor family for the old records show that Eberhard Ream was gradually acquiring more property. By the Autumn of 1750, he had already received patents for more than 900 acres of rich farm land adjoining his original homestead.

"WHEREAS, By encouragement given by the Honorable William Penn, Esq., late Proprietary and Governor of the province of Pennsylvania, and by permission of his Majesty, King George the First...divers Protestants, who were subjects of the Emperor of Germany, a Prince in amity with the Crown of Great Britain, transported themselves and estates into the province of Pennsylvania, between the years one thousand seven hundred and one thousand seven hundred eighteen; and since they came hither have contributed very much to the enlargement of the British Empire...and have always behaved themselves religiously and peacably... And whereas Many of said persons... of Lancaster county, in the said province of Pennsylvania.. qualified themselves by taking the qualification, and subscribing the declaration directed to be taken and subscribed by the several acts of parliament, made for the security of his Majesty's person and Government, ad for preventing the dangers which may happen by Popish Recusants, have humbly signified to the Govnernor and Representatives of the freemen of this province... that they have purchased and do hold lands of the proprietary, and others, his Majesty's subjects within this province, and have likewise represented their great desire of being made partakers of those privileges which the natural born subjects of Great Britain do enjoy within this province; and it being just and reasonable, that these persons who have bona fide purchased lands, and who have given such testimony to their affection and obedience to the Crown of Great Britain should as well be secured in the enjoyment of their estates, as encouraged in heir laudable affection and zeal for the English constitution;

Be it enacted by the Hon. Patrick Gordon, Esq., Lieut. Governor of the province of Pennsylvania, &c, by and with the advice and consent of the freemen of the said province, in General Assembly meet, and by the authority of the same. That\* ..... John Swope... Everhard Ream, all of Lancaster be, and shall be to all intents and purposes deemed, taken, and esteemed, His Majesty's natural born subjects of the province of Pennsylvania, as if they and each of them had been born within the said province; and shall and may, and every one of them shall and may, within this province, take, resolve, enjoy and be entitled to all rights, privileges and advantages of natural born subjects.....



  - Here is Niclaus Rihm, his wife Elisabeth, born Reider.
- She was the daughter of Michael Reider and they were married 26 Apr 1743 (Denniston). They had eight children. If the figure on the stone is correct that she lived in marriage 18 years to Nicholas, that would place her death in 1761 the same year as Eberhard's wife died and the year before the cemetery was deeded.
- Nicholas and Elizabeth are my 7x Great Grandparents

**1745** – **Eberhard became interested in the Moravian Church** and wanted the Moravian clergy to build a church on his land, but instead in 1745 they built a school and a church on the farm of Henry Haller, Sr, which started a disagreement between Riehm and the Moravians. Bishep Cammerhoff of the Moravian Church wrote a letter dated 20 Mach 1748,

"there is a man at Muddy Creek, named Eberhard Riehm, in whose house, if my memory serves me right, our dear Father (Count Zinzindorf) preached and of whom Lischy, when in was still at Muddy Creek, made much ado, because he had 700 acres of land and was best able to pay, while the rest of the brethren were poor people. He is a restless and puffed up fellow. He got the fantastic idea into his head, when the Brethren first came to Muddy Creek that they should build a meeting house for them on his land. He had the idea that when the building was erected on his land, the Brethren would be under him and he would be the trustee and regent of the congregation, as the Brethren would live there by his grace. But we did not accept bis offers and propositions. Hence he became critical and sought to make out of his children a gang (of whom four lived on his land in separate families, but in such a manner that he had not given them any

land, could chase them off, if he wanted to do so). He told them that he had 700 acres of land, while in Bethlehem there were only 500. He would unite with them and build a Bethlehem together on his plantation. And then more people would move to him than to Bethlehem. All these ideas were probably the fruits of the principles which Lischy has circulated along these people, when he first preached there."

"To all people to whom these presents shall come Abraham Riehm of Cocalico in the County of Lancaster in the Province of Pennsylvania, yeoman, and Anna Maria his wife, one of the daughters of John Leinbach late of Oley in the County of Berks, yeoman deceased. Send greetings. Whereas the said John Leinbach being in his lifetime at the time of his decease seized of lands, tenements and hereditaments and possessed of goods and chattels intestate leaving issue of three sons and two daughters, namely: Frederick, Henry, John, the said Anna Maria and Maria Barbara, the wife of David Nicchman (Nitschmann); and it is agreed by and between them the said Frederick, Henry, John and the said Abraham Riehm and Anna Mary his wife, that the said Frederick, Henry and John, and the said Abraham Riehm and Anna Maria his wife, that the said Frederick, Henry and John shall pay the debts of the said deceased father and have, hold and enjoy to them their heirs executors administrators respectively all and singular aforesaid lands, tenements, goods and chattels in such share or proportion as they shall agree for consideration of eighty-four pounds." This continues at length with quit claim

details and is dated fifth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty-five in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second by the Grace of God, King over Great Britain. Sealed Abraham Riehm, Anna Maria (X) Riehm (her mark and seal, signed and delivered in the presence of Eberhard Rihm and Tobias Rihm.

#### 15 Feb 1759 – Eberhard deeds land to his sons.

"When he was about seventy-two years old, Eberhard Ream made a partial distribution of his lands, deeding to his sons" 62 1/2 acres to Andrew, 110 to Jacob, 100 to John, 122 to Nicholas and 100 to Mathias. "In each case the consideration was for "five shillings and the natural love and affection which they beareth for their said son". Eberhard signed his name in German, while his wife, Elizabeth, made her mark. These deeds were recorded at Lancaster County courthouse at different times, in 1783, 1786 and 1802.

"It seems evident that the other children also shared in this distribution of property for while they did not have their deeds recorded, the two remaining sons, Abraham and Tobias, later disposed of land received from their father Februry 15, 1759. For deeds connected with this distribution of Eberhard Ream's estate.



# **Inscription**

Settled around 1724 by Everhard Ream and founded as a town by his son Tobias Ream in 1760, originally called Zoar. In 1777, during the Revolutionary War, a field hospital was set up here for wounded soldiers from the Battle of Brandywine, some of whom are buried in the cemetery. During the 18th and 19th centuries, Reamstown was an important stop near the halfway point on the Lancaster-Reading stage coach line.
